



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES FOUR EAGLES GOLD PROJECT

The following is a summary of the Community Engagement management in relation to proposed activity at Four Eagles during the tenure of the Retention Licence currently under application.

The Four Eagles Gold project is located on freehold farming land and during the past 12 years, Tom Burrowes (Providence Gold & Minerals Pty Ltd) has built an excellent relationship with the key landowners in the area where gold has been discovered.

Catalyst has an excellent record of Community Engagement developed at the Four Eagles Gold Project and has formulated a model that would be implemented in the following manner:

Identification of Communities Catalyst will identify all members of the Community who are likely to be impacted by the exploration activities of the proposed project. The activities proposed would have the most significant impact on the landowners upon whose land we propose to explore as well as neighbouring landowners. Because some exploration is required on road verges, communication with the broader community will also be important.

Consultation with Affected Communities The Catalyst approach will be face-to-face meetings with the affected landowners to ensure that we understand their areas of concern with respect to the impact of our programmes on their cropping schedules and their livestock and structural installations. We need to clearly explain the nature and timing of our proposed programme and allow sufficient time for them to provide feedback well before the commencement of the programme.

Informing the Affected Communities Catalyst will ensure that all relevant community stakeholders are informed of the Company's activities in a clear coherent manner. This information will be provided in many ways depending on the level of knowledge required by affected stakeholders. This can be achieved in many ways:

- Personal contact by door knocking, face-to-face meetings, telephone contact followed up by written communication by letter or email outlining the nature of the programme.
- Notification to affected relevant Shire Council, Telstra or Water Supply, or other authorities that may be affected by the activities.
- Media Coverage in local press to inform members of the community who may not be directly affected but who should be aware of the broad programmes in the District.
- Community Meetings of residents, traders and other business and special interest groups to provide information on the company activities.

Community Feedback Catalyst will encourage feedback from all sections of the local community by having an available contact person who can discuss their concerns. This would tend to be the local Project Manager Paul Quigley who will be available by telephone or email.


Programme Follow-up At the conclusion of the programme, further discussion will be carried out with affected landowners to ensure that all rehabilitation has been carried out to their satisfaction and that all necessary compensation has been paid. Any additional information gained from the programme should also be discussed with the landowner.

The objective of the Catalyst Community Engagement Policy is to ensure that strong relationships are developed with the Community and that the Company is seen to be operating to achieve a high level of community confidence and mutual respect. This mutual respect means that the Company will attempt to explain the nature of its obligations under the Exploration Licence commitments of the Victorian EcoDev while understanding the objectives of the local community with respect to livelihood, lifestyle, environment and heritage. It is hoped that constructive consultation with the community and a co-operative approach to exploration will lead to enhanced economic benefits in the area.

The Company always endeavours to keep landowners informed of activities and also to minimise impact in the grain growing areas. Rehabilitation and compensation are key factors in the agreements with landowners.
